***Just a note about scraps.... If you're making this quilt from scraps, you will need to make sure you have pieces no smaller than 5" for all of the lights, mediums and darks. As well, for the lights, you will need to have 11 pcs, no smaller than 10"x10". Hope this helps, for those of you who are goin scrappy!

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #1

Well here we are finally beginning our Plenty of Fish journey. We are so excited that you joined us, and look forward to seeing all of your gorgeous prints transformed into this amazing quilt. With all of these combinations, they will all be one-of-a-kind quilts!

Unlike a traditional pattern where you do all of your cutting at the beginning, we will be cutting as we go. Most of you are goin' scrappy (YAY) and we have no idea how many different prints you are using, and what size of pieces you have. SO, we are going to tell you how many patches to cut in total from your various prints. Cut a little bit from every print. This is the most FUN way to cut for a quilt. Most times I don't end up having enough so I have to go rooting through my scrap bin to find more to make up the total number of patches. This just makes my quilts that much more interesting, adding that ever-so-important element of variety!

One very important note before we begin. You had better be stitchin' with a scant ¼" seam allowance. A scant ¼" is about a thread's width narrower than an exact ¼". It doesn't seem like much, but this thread's width can really mean the difference between a block that finishes to the correct size, and one that doesn't. We will be testing your seam allowance in this first step, so that you have it mastered before you move on.

Ok here we go! Get out your light and medium prints, and press them well. We suggested in an earlier FB post to treat them with Best Press. We put that sh*t on everything;).





From your assorted medium prints, cut $80 - 3 \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. From your assorted light prints, cut $40 - 3 \frac{1}{2}$ " squares.

Stitch a light square to a medium square, right sides together. Now take a medium square and stitch it to the remaining side of the light square. Press the seam towards the medium square.

Begin by setting the seam.


Setting your seams is an important part of the pressing process. Because seams can pucker and even twist the fabric slightly, setting seams prior to pressing helps them lay flat and straight by locking the threads. To "set the seam", gently press it in its closed position before opening and pressing. After setting the seam, open each unit and press again.



Seam Allowance Test Time

The unit you have just stitched should measure 3 ½" x 9 ½". If it measures *less* than 9 1/2" long, then your seam allowance is too big.... If it measures *more* than 9 1/2" long, then your seam allowance is too small. Most people err on the side of a larger seam allowance.

Adjust your needle position on your machine (if you can) to just a hair less than 1/4". If you cannot adjust your needle position, you can visit your local quilt shop and pick up one of many tools that will help set that perfect seam allowance on your machine. Main thing, the needle needs to come down at a hair less than ¼" away from the right edge of the fabric. Once you have your seam allowance correct, make 40 of these units, chain piecing. Press the seam toward the medium square.







Now sit back, admire your work and read some smut!

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Post #2

Congratulations on finishing Step 1! We hope you nailed the scant 1/4" seam allowance, because it becomes even more important in the steps to follow. If you're scared of triangles and points, have NO FEAR! Remember that accuracy is the key to perfect piecing, and that means each and every step; cutting, pressing and of course seam allowance.






You are going to continue to play with those lights and mediums, so get them back out and cut 30 - 3 7/8" squares from both your light and medium prints. I have 4 prints shown in the photo here (2 lights and 2 mediums), that I will use to walk you through this step.

Take your ruler and align the 45° angle line (the white line that my pointer finger is touching in the photo) along one edge of the square. The right edge of the ruler should be a diagonal line from one corner of the square to the other.





Cut along the edge of the ruler, separating the square into 2 triangles. Do this for both sets of light and medium squares. This will yield 60 triangles of lights and 60 triangles of mediums.



Lay out the triangles as shown in this photo. The mediums should oppose each other, and the lights should oppose each other. You will be making

hourglass blocks.

Stitch the triangles together in pairs of medium and light, set and press the seam to the medium triangles.








Now you will lay the two segments together so that the seams "nestle" and lock together between your fingers. Personally, I am a nonpinner, but please feel free to pin this intersection so that your seams will line up nicely after being stitched together. My preference is Silk Pins, as they have a finer shaft and don't take up too much space.



Stitch the triangle segments together to make 30 hourglass blocks. Set and press the seam to either side.

Now it's time to square the blocks. These need to measure 4 3/4" square If you have a 5 or 5 1/2" ruler, this is ideal, otherwise you can use a 12" square ruler. Lay the ruler on top of the block so that the diagonal line runs through the block as you see in the photo. The 2 3/8" marking should be at the center of the block as shown below.






Trim along the right and top edge of the ruler WITHOUT moving the ruler. I have a rotating cutting mat that makes this easier, but with practice and a steady hand, you can cut across the top without shifting the ruler.

Now rotate the block so that the freshly cut edges are along the bottom and left sides as you face the block. Lay the ruler back down on the block and square up the bottom left hand corner with the 4 3/4" marking as shown in the photo below.

Square up all 30 blocks to 4 3/4" and step 2 is complete! Time to admire and share your progress with everyone!

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt

Lots to do this time, 2 parts to this step, so let's get right down to it!

Get out your lights and your darks, yes your darks, YAY!




Part A:

From assorted darks <u>and</u> lights cut 30 4 1/4" squares. Cut each square twice on the diagonal to yield 120 triangles of darks, and 120 triangles of lights.


*Bias Option... If you prefer to have the bias edge on the <u>outside</u> edge of the triangle, you may cut 60 3" squares and cut once diagonally.

Make triangle pairs as shown in the photos below. You will make 60 of each triangle set. Press the seam toward the dark triangle.

A special TIP from Devon.... When stitching triangle pairs together, try feeding them through your machine with the point end first (as shown). Sometimes triangle points can wander while being stitched, and this way they stay true. To each her own, just something you might want to try!





Part B:

From assorted darks cut 120 3 1/2" squares.

From assorted lights cut 60 4 1/4" squares. Cut each square twice on the diagonal to yield 240 triangles. *Bias Option... If you prefer to have the bias edge on the <u>inside</u> edge of the triangle, you may cut 120 3" squares and cut once diagonally.

Lay a light triangle down on top of a dark square so that points on each side are extending past the square the same amount on each side. If you'd like to find the center of the square, finger press the square in half, and align the inside point of the triangle with the crease you've made. Eyeball it after you've done a few!

Stitch the triangle onto the square. Do this for all 120 squares. Chain Piece, and press the seam toward the triangle.




Now to find the center of the square again. This time, since one side of the square is now stitched to the triangle, you are losing 1/4". BUT the center of the square remains the same. Fold and finger press again as shown in this picture, and try not to notice that Devon needs a nail appt.



When you lay the triangle down on the square, line up the inside point of the triangle with the new crease you've made. You will also notice that the edges of the triangle extend the same amount beyond the square/triangle unit below. Stitch the triangle on and press the seam toward the triangle. If you've sew the first triangle on correctly, and have laid this one on top accurately, you will begin stitching at the point where the two triangles meet. See the photo to the right, slightly blurred, but I had to blow it up:)







Stitch a second triangle onto each of the 120 units you've already made. Do one first so that you get it right, and then do the rest so you don't end up making a boo-boo and have to rip out 240 triangles. Ain't nobody got time for dat!

This is what this little baby should look like now! I love him/her. I want to give it a name and wrap it up! All 240 of them! These should measure 4 3/4" wide.



You'll need to trim those cute little ears off now, so go ahead and pop in Magic Mike on the telly, and trim away.



If your unit ends up looking like this.... You can trim it, if it's within 1/16", but more than that, and it will not measure up, as the triangle is set in too high. Try it again until they line up. Triangles can be funny until you learn how to work with them, not against them. And don't they make up some of the most stunning quilts? Master these triangles and you will take your piecing to a whole new level. Don't give up! The reward is GREAT!





This was a bigger step, a lot more work. Told you the intensity would be greater as we went along. Another learning curve for some. Don't be discouraged. Anything worth doing, is worth doing well. Be proud of yourself and this accomplishment. This quilt soooo kicks ass, and you are going to be so glad you stayed!


Chapter 3

It is not so important who starts the game but who finishes it.




Now that you all have an uncanny fondness for triangles, I'm going to give you more. Once we get the triangles outta the way, we can start assembling units. The fun is just beginning! Don't worry, Step #4 is easy and familiar. You've done it already.

Now you're just going to do it smaller!

From assorted darks cut 10 - 4 3/4" squares. Cut each square twice on the diagonal to yield 40 triangles. From assorted lights cut 10 - 4 3/4" squares. Cut each square twice on the diagonal to yield 40 triangles. YES. You are cutting the exact same amount from your lights and darks.

*Bias Option... If you prefer to have the bias on the outside edge of the block, you may cut 20 - 3 1/4" squares and cut once diagonally.







Lay out the triangles as shown in the photo on the left. The darks should oppose each other, and the lights should oppose each other. You will be making hourglass blocks.

Stitch the triangles together in pairs of dark and light, set and press the seam to the dark triangles as shown in the photo on the right.



Now you will lay the two segments together so that the seams "nestle" and lock together between your fingers. Personally, I am a non-pinner, but please feel free to pin this intersection so that your seams will line up nicely after being stitched together. My preference is Silk Pins, as they have a finer shaft and don't take up too much space.







Stitch the triangle segments together to make 20 hourglass blocks. Set and press the seam to either side.

Now it's time to square the blocks. Good news is, I had you cut larger so that you had room to square down this time. These need to measure 3 1/2" square. If you have a 5 or 5 1/2" ruler, this is ideal,

otherwise you can use a 12" square ruler. Lay the ruler on top of the block so that the diagonal line runs through the block as you see in the photo. The 1 3/4" marking should be at the center of the block as shown to the right.







Trim along the right and top edge of the ruler WITHOUT moving the ruler. I have a rotating cutting mat that makes this easier, but with practice and a steady hand, you can cut across the top without shifting the ruler.

Now rotate the block so that the freshly cut edges are along the bottom and left sides as you face the block. Lay the ruler back down on the block and square up the bottom left hand corner with the 3 1/2" marking as shown in the photo below.

Square up all 20 blocks to 3 1/2" and step 4 is complete! Time to admire and share your progress with everyone!

Here's what you DON'T do.... Notice the 2 problems with these units I sewed? First of all, they don't make hourglass units because I didn't sew all the sets together the same way. I ripped half of them apart and then sewed them back together properly to make the hourglass blocks.



Secondly, These are sewn with my lights and mediums, not my lights and darks.

Dang. So I sewed them wrong, twice. Looks like I'm making a little night stand quilted topper.

Whatevs!



The Road Less Travelled ~ Bonus Mini Quilt



You'll need a fat quarter of a light, peach & purple. For the brown you can use a fat quarter (FQ), but the last border will have to be pieced. If you'd rather not piece the last border, use 1/4y x wof (width of fabric).

From the brown print cut 1 strip 2 1/2" x wof or 2 strips from a FQ. Cut into 16 2 1/2" squares. Set aside.



From the light <u>and</u> the peach print cut 2 strips 1 1/2" x wof or 4 strips from a FQ. Stitch these strips together along the length, and press the seam towards the peach. Cut these strips into 32 2 1/2" units.



From the brown <u>and</u> the purple print cut 2 strips 1 1/2" x wof or 4 strips from a FQ. Stitch these strips together along the length and press the seam towards the purple. Cut these strips into 32 1 1/2" units.

Rotate one of the units to align and make a 4 Patch. Stitch the units together to make 16 4 Patches and press the seam in either direction.







Assemble the rows referring to the photo for placement. Press the seams for each row in alternating directions. The widths for the borders are as follows:

Border 1, cut 1" strips. Border 2, cut 1 1/2" strips. & Border 3, cut 2 1/2" strips.

We like to use a starch alternative, but it really is invaluable after the rows are joined. It's really important the quilt lays flat for an accurate border measurement. Spritz the quilt with your favorite starch alternative on both sides, and let it rest into the fabric a minute or two. Press well on both sides.

Measure the quilt through the center and both sides. Average the three figures and cut the border strip to this length. Averaging the different lengths in the quilt, even ½" or so, will help keep the quilt square. It's much easier to notice if a small quilt isn't square, and we don't want that!

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #5

Does Step #5 find you all caught up and raring to go? I sure hope so! If not, here's another very simple step to give you some extra catch-up time.

By this time I shouldn't have to remind you to ALWAYS sew with a scant 1/4" seam allowance, but just in case.... Ya... what I just said.


Ladies and Gents.... Get out what is left of your light fabrics. Leave the 10" light

squares alone for now.

From your assorted lights, cut 40 3 1/2" squares.

Also, gather the 20 hourglass blocks you made in Step #4.


Lay them out in the following manner, and place the hourglass block in the same orientation as the photo below.





Stitch the light squares to either side of the hourglass block and press the seam towards the light square. This unit should measure 3 1/2" wide by 9 1/2" long.





This is what the unit should look like from the back side.

Stitch a light square to either side of ALL of the Step 4 hourglass blocks for a total of 20 units.

That's it, that's all! For those of you that need to play catch-up, there's still time! Things get more intense again in Step #6, so enjoy this while it lasts!





Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #6 (twas a mini step, with a bonus!)

You have all been wondering what we are going to do with those eleven light 10" squares. No more wondering!

You are simply going to make sure they measure 10" x 10" and then cut them in half once on the diagonal. Set them aside. DONE!









To make Baby Beloved, you won't need much! Here are the patch amounts and cutting instructions, you should be able to make this from scraps!



Brown - Cut 16, 2" squares

Pink - Cut 16, 2" squares

Light - Cut 6, 3 3/4" squares, then cut once diagonally

Light - Cut 4, 2 1/2" squares, then cut once diagonally

Blue - Cut 1, 4" x 16 1/2" strip

Border - Cut 2, 2 1/2" x 16 1/2" strips & 2, 2 1/2" x 16" strips


Using the brown & pink squares, make 16 Four Patch blocks. Arrange with the light triangles as shown, noting where the side setting triangles are flush with the edge of the Four Patches and the tip of the triangle extends beyond (trim after sewn). Pardon my hand drawn sketch & instructions!

Trim the rows 1/4" away from the edges of the Four

Patches, being careful not to stretch them. They should measure 4 1/2" wide by 16 1/2" long. Stitch the pieced rows to the center blue strip, pressing the seam toward the blue.

Attach the 16 1/2" side borders, and then the 16" top & bottom borders. Bind in blue.

We will begin some assembly of units in this step.

irst gather 60 Step 3b units, and 30 Step 2 hourglasses. Join the units as shown in

First gather 60 Step 3b units, and 30 Step 2 hourglasses. Join the units as shown in this picture, using a scant 1/4" seam allowance as usual. Press the seam towards the hourglass.

You will have 30 of these units.



Notice something about these fabrics used in this step?

These are Devon's and she chose to use pretty much ALL directional fabrics in her mystery quilt.

It's really looking fabulous behind the scenes, will make you think twice about not being afraid to use directionals, for sure!

Now that we are starting to assemble units, you will begin to see how important the scant 1/4" seam allowance is.

I do not think it means

It is the difference between nice sharp points, like the ones in this photo.

No points getting chopped off!

This is a block that will finish to the correct size because of your careful piecing.



Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #8A

Gather 60 3B Units and trim the points (dog ears) off as shown here.





From your mediums, cut 60 - 3" squares and cut once on the diagonal. Lay them on the remaining sides of the trimmed 3B unit and stitch on as shown. Always use a scant 1/4" seam allowance. Press the seam toward the triangle. The units should measure 4 3/4" square. Trim as necessary, removing the dog ears. Make 60.









Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #8B

From your darks, cut 60 - 3 1/2" squares.

Take the triangle units from 3A and attach them to the sides of the dark squares as shown.

The light fabric should be up against the dark square, on BOTH sides.

Stitch on the first 3A as shown and press the seam toward the dark square.

*Remember that there are 60 3A with the light fabric on the right, and 60 3A with the light on the left.

Notice that the first 3A unit to be stitched on, has the light fabric on the right side.





Stitch another 3A, with the light fabric on the left hand side to the next side of the dark square, referring to the photo on the left below for placement. Press the seam toward the 3A unit this time.

The photo on the right shows the back side of the unit, and the directions that the seams should be pressed.

Make 60 units.





Cinnamon Tea Buns... from the kitchen of POF'r Elaine Hale Woodford

4 cups flour 1/2 tsp salt
1/2 cup sugar 2 eggs
1 cup butter or margarine
4 tsp baking powder 3/4 cup milk
1 cup cinnamon chips 1 tsp vanilla extract

Combine flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Cut in margarine with a pastry blender. In a separate bowl, beat eggs, milk and vanilla extract. Add to dry ingredients. Add cinnamon chips. Stir with a fork to make a soft dough. Knead a few times. Roll to about 1 1/2 inch thick and cut out with cutter.

Bake @ 400 deg. for 12 - 15 minutes.

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #9A

Go all the way back to your very 1st step, and gather the 40 units you made that look like this



Now gather the 20 units you made in step 5 that look like this







Lay a Step 1 unit on either side of a Step 5 unit, just like these pictures are laid out! Stitch em' together to make a block.

*Correction — You will need to re-press the seams from Step 1 towards the light center square.



Make 20.

Press the seams in the block towards the outer Step 1 unit. Give the blocks another spritz with your store-bought Best Press, Or home-made starch.

Step #9B

Now gather ALL of the Step 8A units. Take 10 and arrange them into a row, just like this picture below. Notice the orientation of the blocks. The mediums should 'face' each other, and the lights should 'face' each other as well. As well, the row begins and ends with lights on the outside. Stitch into a row. Make 3 rows just like this. Press the seam allowance in either direction, it doesn't matter which way it gets pressed.



You should have 30 units remaining. Take 10 and arrange them into a row, again just like this picture below.

Notice the orientation of the blocks. The mediums should 'face' each other, and the lights should 'face' each other as well. This time, the row begins and ends with mediums on the outside. Stitch into a row. Make 3 rows just like this. Press the seam allowance in either direction, it doesn't matter which way it gets pressed.

As she logged on, for the last time, a message popped up.

Merlin decided hastily not to open the message. She didn't want to feel rejection. Her cursor hovered over the "Delete Account" button.

Merlin and Elaine exchanged a glance for a few moments, as she clicked on.....

Time for things to start coming together, don't you think?
So with only 3 steps left,
here's your next block construction.

This lovely star block is made up of the 30 units you made in Step 7 (middle) and the 60 units you assembled in Step 8B.

Lay an 8B unit on either side of a 7 as shown in the pictures on the right.

Pin the intersections as shown here. We use silk pins. They have a finer shaft than regular or flower head pins which means they won't shift your seam out of place while stitching, won't bend your needle if you stitch over them, and won't leave a gaping print behind in your fabric!

Stitch an 8B to either side of the 7's, pressing the seam toward the middle, 7.



Notice above that some of the same fabric is touching? That's totally ok in a scrappy quilt! Just go with it!

Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #10





Here's your finished block! Make 30 of these cuties! They should finish very close to 9 1/2" square. You will need to trim the excess and points. We have a 9 1/2" square ruler overtop of our block, perfect for trimming!



Plenty of Fish Mystery Quilt Step #11

Alrighty everyone, here is the validation you have been looking for!

The majority of your layout guesses were correct!

However, take note of the orientation of all of the blocks. Notice that every second star block has the hourglass up and down, the next being tilted so the hourglass is horizontal? Same thing with the alternate block (with the small hourglass in the middle), every second block is tilted in opposite the direction.

Lay out all of your blocks in the way, and place the setting triangles around the edges.

Refer to this photo for placement.







This quilt layout is what we refer to as "On Point", when the blocks are turned from their horizontal position to create a new setting. Note that this diagram is for a different quilt, with a fewer amount of blocks. This is just for reference only. Arrange the blocks and setting triangles following the quilt diagram on the previous page. Stitch the rows together. The arrows in this diagram indicate the pressing direction for each row. Alternate directions so that your rows fit together nicely.

While you are joining these rows, you will notice that the occasional seam does not oppose. This is something that cannot always be avoided, and can easily be remedied by using "The Clipping Trick", made well known by artist Jo Morton.


Done frequently in garment making, the Clipping Trick can easily and safely be used in quilting. It's simply making a partial snip into a seam allowance in order for that seam to lay flat once stitched together. Here are some pictures of what a clipped seam will look like, in our quilt.



Once the quilt top is together, handle the










stretch and distort. It's time to square the quilt top. You will need to trim 1/4" away from the points of the blocks on all 4 sides of the quilt. Begin by placing a 12" square ruler on a corner, making sure it is 1/4" away from both intersection points on the blocks on both sides. Trim evenly on all 4 corners. Then, with a 24" long ruler, trim each side evenly, maintaining 1/4" distance from the block points. If you will not be attaching your border right away, we recommend that your stay stitch a very scant 1/4" all the way around the outside edge of the quilt, to prevent distortion and stretching. The quilt should measure 64" x 76 1/2".








Pieced Border Option

Gather the rows you assembled in Step 9B. From a 9B row that begins and ends in lights, separate into two smaller rows of 5 blocks each. Reverse stitch here:



You will now have 2 short rows that look like this:



Now attach one of those shorter rows to a long 9B row that begins and ends with lights.

This completed row will begin with a light, and end with a medium.

The row consists of 15 blocks, and should measure 4 3/4" wide and 64" long once stitched together.

Repeat the steps above to make one more row just like this. These will be the top and bottom rows.




Join Here



Following the instructions in Steps 3B and 8A, make 6 more 4 3/4" blocks.

From a 9B row that begins and ends with mediums (they're the only 3 rows left). Separate into two smaller rows of 5 blocks each. Reverse Stitch here:



Add 3 individual 4 3/4" blocks to each of these rows of 5, and then attach to another 9B row.





The row consists of 18 blocks and should measure 4 3/4" wide and 76" long once stitched together. It will begin and end in mediums. Make one more row, but this row will need to begin and end in lights. So simply take one block off the end of the row and add to the other end.

From your dark prints, cut four 4 3/4" squares. Stitch them to either end of these rows and press the seam away from the plain square. These will be the side rows.

Stitch the top and bottom rows to the quilt and press the seam towards the border. Then stitch the side rows onto the quilt and press towards the border. Stay stitch around the edges to keep seams intact. And Voila!

Double Border Option

Add another border to the pieced border, to make this quilt just a smidge larger.


Cut 8 strips 4 1/2" by Width of Fabric from your border print. If you are joining these strips end to end, 8 strips will be enough. If you are joining on this bias, cut 9




Measuring for Borders

Measure the quilt's length through the center and trim 2 lengths to that measurement. Pin, stitch to the sides, and press towards the border.

Measure the quilt's width (including side borders) through the center and trim 2 lengths to that measurement. Pin, stitch to the top and bottom, and press towards the border.
